During breakout sessions, the TCHS Be Nice Leadership group learned the meaning of stigma, why mental health was important and how to reach out to others. Drew Cady, Junior at Oxford High School, was the keynote speaker. He spoke about his experience during the Oxford High School shooting and what he did and continues to do to persevere and overcome the challenges after the tragic event.

The TCHS Be Nice Leadership group will be collaborating with Mrs. Harkness to reboot the Be Nice program at TCHS. This will include a Be Nice assembly, Be#4 Foundation Assembly in connection with a Tri County Varsity Basketball game, and building wide activities. 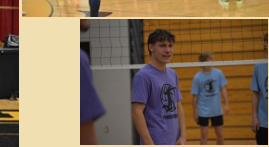
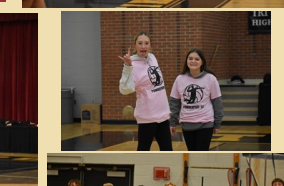


## Kind Post-It Wall Shares Positive Vibes

## Grants Awarded to the Middle School STEM Program

We want to congratulate Dr. Christina Adamson, Computer/STEM teacher at the Middle School for being awarded several grants that will support the STEM program and Computer classes at the Middle School. Grants received to date are:

Walmart Community Fund-Comstock Park Sam's Club-\$1000

MACUL-Michigan Association of Computer Users in Learning-\$844 for BreakOut EDU physical kits & digital access

Eduporium-Awarded 9 MakeyMakey inventor kits (\$500 value)

CYBER.org-Awarded 10 micro-bit microcomputers and one cyber bot (\$500 value)

Great Lakes Energy-\$2000

Students are very excited about the Breakout EDU kits, as well as the digital platform, with the “lock of the day” activity being one of their favorites. Students in Computers 2 and 3 have started building robots, using the VEX IQ robotics, which was purchased at the end of last year. These students have also used the MakeyMakey inventor kits, programming the MakeyMakey on MakeCode to create a game. They also made different kinds of cardboard switches that activated a sound when the switch completed a circuit. All computer classes got to experience the physical Breakout EDU kits at the end of October and are looking forward to one in December as well!

Students in Computers 1 have been learning the different ways that code can be written; encrypted and decrypted. They've learned about Caesar ciphers, pigpen ciphers, and binary code that uses numbers and alphabet letters. Students created bracelets using binary code to spell out their names and noticed some interesting patterns with the binary alphabet.

At the November Board of Education meeting, the Tri County Board of Education approved the “Girls who Code” program as an extra-curricular activity to be offered for all students to participate in. The free coding curriculum provided for this program is focused toward female students in an effort to close the gender gap in STEM. The Rural Technology Fund has also agreed to be a community partner for TCMS Girls who Code program.

Lots of good things are happening for TCMS STEM! Great work Dr. Adamson!



## Athletes As Mentors Program Initiated at the Middle School

A new program has been initiated at the Middle School called “High School Athletes As Mentors”. Jaime Harkness, Behavior Interventionist for both the High School and Middle School developed the program which began in October. The purpose of this program is to connect middle school students with positive role models at the high school athletic level, in an effort to help middle school students grow socially, athletically, emotionally, and academically.

This group meets once a month for an hour to talk about school, sports, and other interests, then ends the hour with some time to throw the football, shoot hoops, play volleyball, and just have some fun! Our first meeting included 6th and 7th graders who enjoyed spending time with Varsity football players Jayden Button, Mike Stout, and Owen Behrenwald.





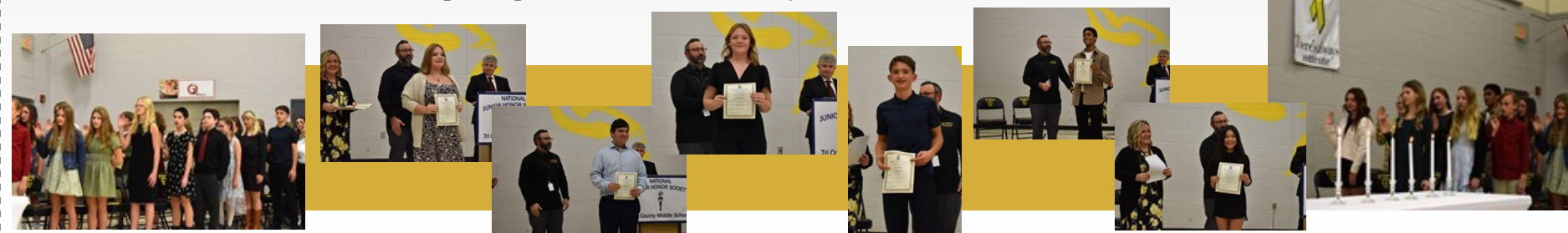

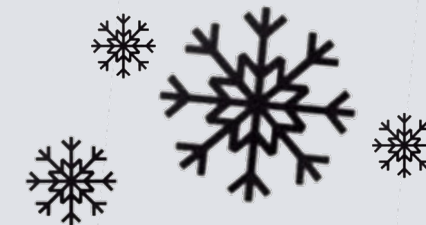
### EMERGENCY CLOSING INFORMATION

Inclement weather, hazardous road conditions, power outages or other incidents may require the closing of school. However, there are strict state requirements on the number of hours of education for public school students. The state provides up to 30 hours, or equivalent to 6 days and hours) for inclement weather/emergency closing. We are required to make up any additional hours. With student safety as our first priority, every effort is made to avoid school closings when possible. In bad weather, the decision to close school is made after:

- Road conditions are tested by the District Operations and Transportation Departments
- Weather conditions are examined (weather advisories, storm patterns, temperature, etc.)
- Montcalm County Road Commission's ability to plow area roads is determined
- The condition of school driveways and parking lots are assessed

The Superintendent closes school based on the severity of these items coupled with our ability to transport our students safely.

When the District closes school or releases students early, we send out a robocall and email to all parents, notify the local TV news stations, and post closing information to our district social media outlets and our district website homepage. Please do not call your child's school.
