### Thoughts from the Superintendent's desk

I would like to take a moment to thank our parents for your continued involvement in our schools. At last week's parent/teacher conferences we had over 91% attendance for MacNaughton and 90% for Sand Lake.

As we continue to work toward our goal of building a closer partnership with the community, I wanted to share with you some of the exciting events that are helping us to connect with the community.

I first want to start with the 2nd Annual TC Mini Relay for Life, which was a very large community event that raised over \$26,000 toward cancer research. We had teams from schools, businesses, and community come out and support this great event. We have also partnered with local businesses for our Community Based Vocational Training program, which currently involves about 9 of our high school students. Through this program, these students are learning and building skills to help them prepare for work after high school.

I also want to thank the Panhandle Chamber of Commerce for inviting 3 of our high school students to speak at their recent Annual Chamber Dinner. Abbie Wall and Kelsy Hackbardt spoke regarding how the high school Media class is using iMovie and Desktop Publishing to promote the high school. It was a great opportunity for our students to learn valuable public speaking skills, as well as connect with businesses on how Tri County Area Schools may be able to partner and support our local businesses.

# TC Golf team season ends in success

The Tri County Girls' Varsity Golf team has completed yet another successful season. This season, the girls' golf team set the 18-hole school record with a 401 and the 9-hole school record with a 201. The team placed fourth in the Lakes 8 conference and sixth out of fourteen teams at the Regional Tournament. The girls also took third place out of eight teams at the Fruitport Invitational and ninth place out of eighteen teams at the Ludington Invitational. The team cut five strokes from both their 9-hole and 18-hole team averages from last year.

Lyndsae Kranz, Baylee Zemla, and Taylir Kral were all seniors on the team this year. Lyndsae has improved her 9-hole average by 15 strokes and her 18-hole average by 45 strokes over her four years on the golf team. She placed 32nd individually at the regional tournament this year. Overall, she has placed in the top three for our team every year and has been a great asset in the success the girls' golf team has experienced.

Baylee has also played an integral role in the success of the team. She has improved 9-hole average by 18 strokes and her 18-hole average by 40 strokes over her four years on the golf team. Baylee has placed in the top four for our team every year. She placed 42nd individually at the regional tournament. Not only did Baylee contribute to the team with her golf score, but also contributed to the team with her remarkable personality. She is well-known by everyone in our conference.

Taylir has played on the team for two remarkable years. She has placed in the top ten individuals for tournaments eleven times. She has taken first place in 9-hole matches nine times. Taylir has been awarded first-team all-conference honors both years she has played for the team. She qualified for the state finals both years as well. Last year she placed 27th in the state and this year she placed





26th in the state. Taylir has also played a very essential role in the success of the Tri County girls' golf team.

These three seniors will be immensely missed. Next year, Lauren Corwin will be leading the team as she played second on the team throughout this past season. Nikki Minard will be a fourth-year player next year and will also be leading the team. Hannah Drouin, Cierra Kargenian, Lilia Hauenstein, and Lakyn Piotrowski were all first-year players this year and will play an essential role in the success of the team next season.

# **Parent and Teacher Perform at Kent Theater**

The acting bug has bitten the Tri County community as both a parent and a teacher are starring in the Rouge River Community Theater Company's (RRCTC) production of A Carol for Tiny Tim. David Holsworth, father of TCHS sophomore Aubrey Patterson-Holsworth and John Bagin, TCHS teacher are both involved in this holiday production. A Carol for Tiny Tim builds upon Charles Dicken's classic A Christmas Carol by looking at what happens to young Tiny Tim 20 years in the future. The play features many of the same characters as the original play including all three ghosts, Ebeneezer Scrooge, Jacob Marley, and the entire Cratchit family. David became involved with the theater last year when his daughter responded to an invitation from her history teacher and RRCTC veteran, Mr. Bagin, for actors to try out for roles in an upcoming play about the Titanic. Aubrey was cast in a role and David was 'stuck' transporting the car-less Freshman to play practices. After a few practices the cast of the play was still incomplete. David, realizing that he was attending all of the play practices, decided to help fill one of the roles. From that moment on he was hooked on acting. Aubrey became busy with other activities at TCHS but her father continued acting with the RRCTC,

having the lead character in last spring's Sherlock Holmes play. Once again, David has the lead in this production as the older Tiny Tim while Bagin appears as the Ghost of Christmas Present, who attempts to correct Tim in his ways. A Carol for Tiny Tim is an inspiring, holiday-themed play for the entire family and it runs on November 14, 15 and 16th at 7:30pm with a matinee performance at 2:00pm on the 16th at the Kent Theater in Cedar Springs. Tickets are \$10 for adults and kids under 18 get in for \$5.

# Sand Lake Elementary grows green



Sand Lake students have been recycling for years. This year, we have added to our "Go Green" projects. Students in Miss Bolt's and Mrs. Schmidt's fourth grade classes planted seeds last month. The project is to grow a salad before a deep freeze puts an end to the growing season. A variety of lettuce plants and some radishes are growing in our school greenhouse and in a raised bed garden. Miss Bolt's students are keeping temperature records inside and outside the greenhouse as part of an experiment to see how long they can keep lettuce growing after it gets too cold outside. Some of the students are

working on a design for using water barrels to provide water for the plants. Fifth grade science classes are also using the greenhouse as an environment for growing mold spores. They are conducting an investigation using the scientific method. Students throughout the school are composting appropriate breakfast and lunch scraps. Third grade students have taken turns turning the Compost Tumbler to help the materials inside decompose. The composter, greenhouse, and garden are providing students at Sand Lake with many new learning opportunities.
